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Partners meet in person



A fter the disruption of the past few years, it was a great joy for Denis Pontin (above) and David Knox (representing the Hamlin Fistula Australia Board) along with Doug Marr (Executive Officer of HFA) to travel to Ethiopia together for the Partners International Meeting (PIM), in July this year. They were pleased to meet the new Chair of the Board of Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia Dr Mengistu Asnake, and renew their long friendship with Tesfaye Mamo, Chief Executive Officer of the hospital.

The CEO highlighted the challenges resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, the war in Ukraine which has caused significant economic pressures, including severe supply chain issues and the civil unrest in Ethiopia, particularly in northern Ethiopia, which has impacted on the staff at Mekelle in Tigray and the health centres across the area.

Despite these hurdles, Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia (HFE) has continued to increase the number of patients who receive surgical treatment with the highest number of surgeries performed in at least 15 years. The enthusiasm of the medical staff at the PIM was very noticeable and the surgeons, other clinical staff and all nurses and staff have enabled HFE to deliver all the core objectives in the plan which were set for 2021/2.

The presentation by the surgeons from each regional hospital at the PIM was informative and challenging. Although the hospital focuses on fistula treatment there is a chronic need to

treat Pelvic Organ Prolapse (Stages 3 and 4) which is just as debilitating as a fistula for the young women presenting at the hospitals. The surgery to repair these horrific prolapses was wholeheartedly supported by all present, especially as the women were not able to get treatment at a government hospital. This presentation brought home the positive, transformational impact that the work has on the lives of so many women. Denis visited Harrar and saw girls from as young as 18 and no older than 28 being treated for Stage 3 or 4 prolapse due to the hard physical work they do each day, and the lack of good nutrition. The surgery was life-changing for them.

News from the Midwives' College

enis, David and Doug attended the graduation ceremony for the 2022 intake at the Hamlin College of Midwives. The expansion of the Midwives College to include Masters' students began in 2021 and the plans to expand the educational facilities at the College to enable it to be accredited as a high-level tertiary College were discussed. The Board of HFA has agreed to fund Stage 1 of the expansion of the College. This funding will go towards significant building work which will include a new dormitory for up to 90 students in the MSc program, two lecture halls, a new two storey library and remodelling the existing library, a new cafeteria and kitchen as well as a student café and new kitchen extension. Large scale landscape works will be required including access roads, and removal of asbestos clad buildings as well as new security fencing to protect the students and staff from hyenas.

Rehabilitation

Rehabilitation and reintegration are fundamental to the Hamlin model of care and continues to be provided across the organisation. At Desta Mender Rehabilitation Centre there is a program with 75 ex-patients learning a range of life skills. Stage 1 of the expansion program includes a new training centre and a sports field on the paddock near the Juniper Café for students, rehabilitation participants and the local community to enjoy.

In partnership with Women's Hope International (WHI) Desta Mender has delivered a new Women Empowerment Program for the last two years with trainee numbers now over 70 for each intake. It is planned to continue this programme in 2022/23 with three intakes of over 70 patients each across the year. The feedback from ex-patients has been very positive and the project truly life changing for many. Trainees have received practical training in catering and agricultural processing, vegetable farming, poultry farming and pottery.

The HFE team has developed a single standardised assessment form which is being used at all HFE centres to determine patient requirements for rehabilitation and reintegration support. This collects patient level information regarding their needs at admission to the hospital and prior to discharge. This will provide a rich source of information for the future configuration of rehabilitation and reintegration services across all centres and ensure that those patients in most need are prioritised. The Operational Plan for 2021/22 was ambitious. However, HFE managed to double the number of surgical operations to 2,475 (excluding the Mekelle Hospital in Tigray) with 2,584 operations undertaken. This represented a 65% increase on the previous year. The cost of living has impacted Ethiopia and the staff of the Fistula Hospital. Inflation is high. The CEO and his Executive have invested in staff development and improved remuneration, particularly for the lowest paid and established a new living wage.

Denis Pontin reflected on his visit to Ethiopia. "I have visited the hospitals and Midwives' College and the health centres in remote locations where Hamlin Midwives are deployed over the last decade," he said. "When Catherine passed away I was naturally nervous as to how the government appointed Ethiopian Board of Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia would respond to the challenge of continuing the work begun by Drs Reg and Catherine Hamlin. This year I have visited the hospital twice and have been so impressed with the work that is being done. Tesfaye Mamo is a strong Christian and his Christian beliefs shape the culture of HFE as Catherine's did when she was managing the staff. The majority of the executive team are also practising Christians and although the hospital welcomes all faiths, the credo that Reg and Catherine Hamlin had to minister to the poor and outcast with grace and

love through their medical skills and compassion is still evident.

We were all were impressed with the engagement of the staff, particularly the surgeons, in the challenges faced in Ethiopia. There are now around 118 million people in Ethiopia and only about half the births occur with any medical or midwife assistance. Obstructive labour and prolapse are the cause of so much suffering for the women of Ethiopia and through the Hamlin Ethiopian hospitals and midwives as well as the rehabilitation programs at Desta Mender, the women find hope and are restored to a quality of life that was lost without the intervention of Hamlin Fistula.

Due to the challenges of the terrain, poverty, poor nutrition and lack of medical facilities to adequately meet the needs of women in Ethiopia, the work of Hamlin Ethiopia is vital in reaching the women who are at risk or who have suffered birth injuries through lack of medical intervention. The MSc program will provide training to midwives that will allow them to do a Caesarean section when there is no other option to save the baby of a woman in restrictive labour. The funding of the expansion of the Midwives' College and improvements at Desta Mender are a vital part of the continued fight to eradicate fistulas in Ethiopia. I am so proud to be part of this work and be able to see the money given by our donors used to make a difference in the lives of the women of Ethiopia."

We may even become part of the bigger dream held by the beloved *Emaye*, Dr Catherine Hamlin, to eradicate fistula from all of Africa.
